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Last month, RIPTA's Board of Directors voted to approve a collective bargaining agreement with the Amalgamated Transit Union (ATU) Division 618 that would increase the starting driver wage from \$21.71 to \$25.33 per hour. In addition, the top pay step of existing ATU salaries, other than Van Operators, will increase by \$1.00, with lower pay steps adjusted accordingly. ATU 618 represents RIPTA's 488 current fixed-route and paratransit drivers.

"This crucial wage increase benefits not only our drivers, but our passengers as well," said Scott Avedisian, RIPTA's Chief Executive Officer. "This will enable us to attract and retain drivers, ensuring that the public can rely on RIPTA to be there when the bus schedule says we are going to be there."

Historic East Side Tunnel to Close This Month for Renovations



Starting Monday,
March 25, 2024, the
East Side Tunnel will
be closed for repairs
and renovations
through midSeptember. Routes 1,
32, 33, 34, 40 and 61x
will be on detour
beginning Monday,
March 25, 2024
through midSeptember to

accommodate East Side Tunnel construction.

This critical piece of transit infrastructure was built in 1914 to help former trolley lines reach the top of College Hill as they traveled from downtown Providence to the East Side and beyond. The tunnel is still a vital connector today, allowing buses to avoid the steep incline of College Hill.

Starting Monday, March 25, 2024, the following detours will be in place:

Routes 32, 33, 34, 40 and 61x

Inbound trips heading towards Downtown Providence will travel regular route to the intersection of Angell and Thayer Streets, continue onto Angell Street through to Steeple Street and then resume regular route. Passengers will utilize the bus stop on Angell Street at Hope Street.

Outbound trips will travel regular route to North Main Street and the East Side Tunnel, continue up the hill along Waterman Street and then resume regular route. Passengers will utilize the bus stop on Waterman Street at Hope Street.

Route 1

Inbound trips towards Downtown Providence will travel regular route to Thayer Street, left onto Waterman Street, left onto Brook Street, left onto Angell Street, continue onto Angell Street through to Steeple Street and then resume regular route toward downtown Providence.

Outbound trips will travel regular route to North Main Street and the East Side Tunnel, continue up the hill along Waterman Street, turn left onto Brook Street

and then resume regular route.

Proposed Service Changes Update

Last month, RIPTA held public hearings regarding proposed service changes which are the direct result of a critical workforce shortage.

Over 200 members of the public attended the statewide hearings. All input from the public at the hearings will go to RIPTA's Board of Directors along with RIPTA staff recommendations. The Board will vote on the proposed service changes at its next Board meeting. If approved, service changes would go into effect on Saturday, April 6, 2024. Employee Spotlight

Art Poulin, Body Shop Worker

It's the parts that make up the whole. That's the world that Art Poulin and his colleagues in RIPTA's in-house body shop work inhabit.



Whether it's rebuilding the entire exterior of a bus, fixing seats, or replacing sideview mirrors, his job is to put vehicles back together again no matter what mishap has befallen them.

Officially, his work is that of a welder and a metal fabricator, but Poulin says that he and his co-workers pretty much have to be "Mr. Fix It." He started at RIPTA about 10 years ago and says, "If something's broken we have to find a way to put it back together again, and get the bus back on the road." He points to an older bus that is in for refurbishment and is stripped of all its exterior steel panels. "When we're done, that bus will look brand new again," he says. "You'll never know it was in here."

He says he loves the work because there are different challenges every day and because he's part of a great team with colleagues who have their own

specialties – whether it's painting vehicles or recreating parts that are no longer available from vendors.

He was first hired by RIPTA as an operator in the RIde paratransit division after working for years as a driver for FedEx. He came to RIPTA because he had heard it was a good place to work with excellent benefits for employees. He switched to the Utility Division for a while and spent time cleaning and fueling buses before an opening came up in the body shop, giving him the opportunity to utilize welding skills he learned years ago working at General Dynamics.

A native of West Warwick who now lives in Coventry, Poulin is known for his work ethic and creativity. "You have to be able to think outside the box," he says, recalling the assorted array of problems that pull into the body shop. For example, a RIde van recently had an air conditioning unit that wouldn't stay in place. No problem. Poulin figured out how to drill through the roof of the vehicle to safely secure the unit – and if all the parts weren't available, he made them.

When he's not working, Poulin enjoys riding motorcycles with his wife and spending lots of time with their four grandchildren. He's unabashed in his enthusiasm for his colleagues and his job.

"I tell everyone this is the best job I've ever had," he says.
